WHEREAS for generations, Métis Nation citizens in Alberta and the Métis communities comprised of those citizens (collectively, the “**Métis Nation within Alberta**”), have exercised their inherent rights of self-government and self-determination, including through establishing the Métis Nation of Alberta (“**MNA**”) as a distinct Métis government to represent them for the purposes of self-government and advancing their collective Métis rights;

AND WHEREAS historically the federal and provincial governments have refused to recognize the self-government and self-determination rights of the Métis Nation within Alberta and required the MNA to incorporate under Alberta’s *Societies Act* in order to facilitate funding arrangements and intergovernmental relations through an entity that had legal status and capacity as recognized in Canadian law;

AND WHEREAS the Métis Nation within Alberta has long sought to have its self-government recognized through a modern-day treaty or other constitutionally-protected agreement or arrangement with the Crown and has, since 2017, been in negotiations with the federal government to reach such a treaty, including implementation legislation, that once concluded and in effect will mean the MNA no longer needs to rely on Alberta’s *Societies Act*;

AND WHEREAS in August 2023, draft template District Council bylaws were presented to the 95th MNA Annual General Assembly, which were approved by the MNA’s Provincial Council on September 5, 2023 (“**2023 Model Bylaws**”), and were subsequently adopted by resolution of the Citizens’ Council of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government (the “**Citizens’ Council**”) on November 20, 2023;

AND WHEREAS in September 2023, the Otipemisiwak Métis Government Constitution came into force, which established the Otipemisiwak Métis Government as the successor to the MNA, and includes the recognition that for the purposes of good governance and the effective representation of Métis Nation within Alberta Citizens, the Territories of the Métis Nation within Alberta would be subdivided into Districts and that each District would have a District Council which will be a governance structure of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government and have its own legal status and capacity under the treaty and implementation legislation;

AND WHEREAS also in September 2023, the Otipemisiwak Métis Government’s *District Councils Act* (the “*District Councils Act*”) came into force, section 10 of which provides that:

To establish a District Council:

- (a) the Citizens of the District must elect a District Captain;



(b) the District Captain must adopt Bylaws in accordance with section 12 of this Act; and

(c) the Citizens' Council must approve the District Council Bylaws by resolution, whose approval must not be withheld unless the Bylaws do not conform to the Constitution or Otipemisiwak Métis Government Law;

AND WHEREAS on November 20, 2023, the Citizens' Council directed that self-government staff continue engagements with the MNA's Local Councils and Regional Councils as well as newly elected District Captains with a view to establishing District Councils in every District of the Métis Nation within Alberta;

AND WHEREAS on August 13, 2025, the Citizens' Council adopted a resolution to update the 2023 Model Bylaws (the "**2025 Model Bylaws**");

AND WHEREAS further to that engagement, the District Council Bylaws for the Fort Vermilion Métis District were fully approved by the Citizens' Council on July 10, 2024, and re-approved on April 17, 2025, and Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council #74 (the "**Fort Vermilion MNA Local**") has since determined that it is in the best interests of the District Council to revise and re-submit the bylaws for Citizens' Council's further approval (the "**Fort Vermilion Bylaws**", attached hereto as Annex "A"), and a track changes version of the bylaws highlighting these revisions is attached hereto as Annex "B";

AND WHEREAS further to that engagement, the District Council Bylaws for the Peace River Métis District were approved in-principle by the Citizens' Council on March 18, 2025, and Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council #78 Peace River, Métis Nation of Alberta Association Fairview Local Council, and Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council-Manning 2020 (collectively, the "**Peace River MNA Locals**") have since revised the bylaws previously approved in-principle (the "**Peace River Bylaws**", attached hereto as Annex "C"), and a track changes version of the bylaws highlighting these revisions is attached hereto as Annex "D";

AND WHEREAS further to that engagement, the District Council Bylaws for the Grande Prairie Métis District were approved in-principle by the Citizens' Council on April 17, 2025, and Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council #1990 of Grande Prairie and Local #1929 (Valleyview) of the Métis Association of Alberta (collectively, the "**Grande Prairie MNA Locals**") have since revised the bylaws previously approved in-principle (the "**Grande Prairie Bylaws**", attached hereto as Annex "E"), and a track changes version of the bylaws highlighting these revisions is attached hereto as Annex "F";



AND WHEREAS the Fort Vermilion MNA Local, the Peace River MNA Locals, and the Grande Prairie MNA Locals have expressed concern with the potential for duplicative electoral processes that would result if they adopted Article 6.13 of the 2025 Model Bylaws, and have proposed the following update thereto:

“To support an efficient transition process and avoid duplicate elections, the term of a District Councillor elected in the first election for District Council shall be the balance of the term remaining until the next Otipemisiwak Métis Government general election, plus a full four (4) year term.”

AND WHEREAS as a transitional step while the federal government and the Otipemisiwak Métis Government continue negotiations to reach the treaty, the Otipemisiwak Métis Government and its District Councils will continue to rely on incorporated bodies under Alberta's *Societies Act* to provide them with legal status and capacity and to implement and give effect to the Otipemisiwak Métis Government Constitution;

AND WHEREAS once this resolution is approved:

- (a) the Fort Vermilion MNA Local will work with the Otipemisiwak Métis Government's Self-Government Department to:
- (i) coordinate and hold a special meeting of its members to pass a special resolution to adopt the Fort Vermilion Bylaws; and
 - (ii) take all corporate steps required to effect the Fort Vermilion MNA Local's transition to the District Council of the Fort Vermilion Métis District;
- (b) the Peace River MNA Locals will work with the Otipemisiwak Métis Government's Self-Government Department to:
- (i) coordinate and hold a special meeting of the members of Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council #78 Peace River to pass a special resolution to adopt the Peace River Bylaws;
 - (ii) coordinate and hold special meetings of the members of Métis Nation of Alberta Association Fairview Local Council and Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council-Manning 2020 to pass special resolutions through which they will become local community organizations of the Peace River District Council; and
 - (iii) take all corporate steps required to effect the Peace River MNA Locals' transition to the District Council of the Peace River Métis District; and
- (c) the Grande Prairie MNA Locals will work with the Otipemisiwak Métis Government's Self-Government Department to:



- (i) incorporate a new society to function as the Grande Prairie District Council;
- (ii) coordinate and hold special meetings of the members of Métis Nation of Alberta Association Local Council #1990 of Grande Prairie and Local #1929 (Valleyview) of the Métis Association of Alberta to pass special resolutions through which they will become local community organizations of the Grande Prairie District Council; and
- (iii) take all corporate steps required to effect the Grande Prairie MNA Locals' transition to the District Council of the Grande Prairie Métis District.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED THAT:

Approval of Bylaws

1) Notwithstanding any conflict with the 2025 Model Bylaws, including with respect to the term lengths of the District Captains and Councillors elected in the first elections contemplated thereunder, the District Council Bylaws for the Peace River and Grande Prairie Métis Districts, as attached hereto, are approved in accordance with section 10 of the *District Councils Act*.

Re-Approval of Bylaws

2) Notwithstanding any conflict with the 2025 Model Bylaws, including with respect to the term lengths of the District Captains and Councillors elected in the first elections contemplated thereunder, the District Council Bylaws for the Fort Vermilion Métis District, as revised and attached hereto, are re-approved in accordance with section 10 of the *District Councils Act*.

3) The President and Senior Executive Officer of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government are authorized and empowered to take all such further action and to execute and deliver all such further agreements, certificates, instruments, and documents, in the name and on behalf of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government and the Métis Nation of Alberta Association, to carry out the transactions contemplated by the intent and purposes of the foregoing resolutions.

DECISION OF THE OTIPEMISIWAK MÉTIS GOVERNMENT JUDICIAL TRIBUNAL

RE: QUESTIONS OF INTERPRETATION OF LEGISLATION (2025-05)

The Applicant, in his capacity as Chair of the Citizens’ Council and as Senior Director of the Self-Government Department of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government, makes application for an opinion on two questions arising under the *Otipemisiwak Métis Government Self-Government Act* [*Self-Government Act*] and the *Otipemisiwak Métis Government Judicial Branch Act* [*Judicial Branch Act*].

Question 1:

Whether there are any statutory or regulatory conditions that would prevent the Chair from appointing an employee of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government, to serve as Sergeant-at-Arms for either Citizens’ Council meetings or a Citizens’ Gathering.

Question 2:

Whether there are any statutory or regulatory conditions that would preclude the Clerk of the Judicial Tribunal from being cross-trained and included in a pool of Clerks tasked with supporting the Citizens’ Council, Cabinet, Citizens’ Gathering and Committees, provided safeguards are maintained to preserve independence.

Opinion on Question #1

1. The Judicial Tribunal can consider a question of law that has been referred to it by the Citizens’ Council, a District Council, or a Citizen, as set out in Section 63 of the *Judicial Branch Act*.
2. Section 13(2) of the *Self-Government Act* provides that the Chair may appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms to maintain order and security.
3. Section 59(3) of the *Self-Government Act* provides that the Chair may appoint a Sergeant-at-Arms to enforce and maintain order at a Council meeting or a gathering.
4. There is nothing on the face of the any Otipemisiwak Métis Government legislation that would prevent an employee from being appointed Sergeant-at-Arms. It is currently within the legislated authority of the Chair to appoint an employee as Sergeant-at-Arms.



Opinion on Question #2

Introduction and Issue

1. This matter concerns whether the Clerk of the Judicial Tribunal ["Clerk"] of the Otipemisiwak Métis Government ["OMG"], referred to in legislation as the Clerk of the Judicial Branch, may be cross-trained to perform additional administrative or operational duties in other branches or institutions of the OMG.
2. The Judicial Tribunal has determined that cross-training is permissible.

Relevant Law

Judicial Branch Act:

3. Section 7 - Clerk of the Judicial Branch:
 - 7 "The Judicial Branch must employ a clerk who must:
 - a. cause to be kept a record of each file in accordance with section 29 of this Act; and
 - b. perform any other duties assigned to them by regulation or policy."

Analysis

4. Authority to Assign Additional Duties:
 - a. Section 7(b) of the *Judicial Branch Act* expressly authorizes the Clerk to "perform any other duties assigned ... by regulation or policy." This language provides broad discretion to determine appropriate functions for the Clerk.
5. Administrative Control and Independence:
 - a. Section 8 confirms that the Judicial Branch has the power to "employ or retain persons as considered necessary for the operation and administration" of its functions. This autonomy extends to staffing decisions, provided that judicial independence and confidentiality are preserved.
6. Conflict of Interest Safeguards:
 - a. The *Otipemisiwak Métis Government Code of Ethics Act* [*Code of Ethics Act*] imposes a continuing obligation to avoid both actual and perceived conflicts.
 - b. If cross-training places the Clerk in a position to access information or exercise discretion in matters that might later come before the Judicial Tribunal, the Clerk must promptly disclose and withdraw from any related activity.



Judicial Tribunal

7. Need for Ongoing Review:

- a. The Judicial Tribunal recognizes that as matters before the Tribunal continue to grow and the volume of cases continues to increase, the arrangement permitting cross-training may need to be revisited. At such time, the Clerk may be required to become dedicated solely to Judicial Branch functions.

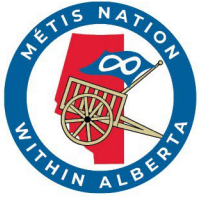
Opinion

8. Having reviewed the relevant provisions of the *Judicial Branch Act* and the *Code of Ethics Act*, the Judicial Tribunal hereby determines:
 - a. The cross-training of the Clerk of the Judicial Branch is authorized under Section 7(b) of the *Judicial Branch Act* as an “other duty assigned ... by regulation or policy.”
 - b. Such authorization is subject to compliance with the provisions in Part III of the *Code of Ethics Act*.
 - c. The Clerk must remain vigilant and immediately disclose any situation giving rise to a real or perceived conflict of interest.
 - d. The Judicial Branch shall periodically review this cross-training arrangement. Where the case load or administrative complexity requires, the Clerk may be reassigned to exclusive service within the Judicial Branch.
